Co-Impact Changes Us *(For the Better)*

Brodie Tse, a student at Richmond Christian School, has experienced a profound shift in perspective through his participation in multiple Co-Impact trips to the Dominican Republic.

Initially hesitant to go due to a self-described “shallow” period in his faith, Brodie’s experiences on the ground completely renewed his spiritual life.

While the team’s project is usually to serve local schools, Brodie emphasizes that the most significant impact was the one the people of the Dominican Republic had on him. He was deeply moved by the faithfulness and gratitude shown by students and teachers at Juan Calvino school, noting that even those facing immense hardships consistently found ways to praise God.

This exposure transformed Brodie’s worldview from a head-knowledge of gratitude to a heart-felt reality.

He now approaches daily life with a focus on positivity and service, inspired by what he describes as the “spirit of Christ” he observed in the Dominican community’s instinct to care for one another.

Now in a gap year before starting university, Brodie has transitioned from a participant to a leader, as he is organizing a student-led sports camp for August 2026 to continue building long-term relationships with his brothers and sisters in Christ.

What Your Visit Meant to Our Community

Hosting our first Co-Impact team was a truly meaningful experience for us. From the moment they arrived, there was a strong sense of connection. The team visited one of our churches and together we experienced the beauty of heaven on earth, where people from all cultures, nations, and languages worship God together.

What stood out most was their humility and willingness to fully engage with the community. They did not remain observers. They worked alongside the construction team on the classroom project, contributing to activities such as mixing concrete, carrying materials, digging trenches, and supporting wherever needed. It felt like a shared effort toward a common goal.

As a Christian organization, it was beautiful to see how the team shared their devotions after a long day's hard work. They inspired us with their love for the Word of God, their openness in sharing life experiences, and about how the Lord is working in their lives. I personally learned a lot about humility and devotion to God from these moments. God bless the team.

The team also spent time in each classroom, sharing words of encouragement, giving gifts, and especially inspiring the final-year students as they prepare for their examinations. It was a simple moment, but there



was a visible sense of joy and connection, allowing the children to engage directly with those supporting their development. Moments like this show that the impact of such visits goes beyond physical projects and extends into relationships and shared human experiences.

We would be very glad to host another Co-Impact team in the future. Their presence strengthened our faith and partnership and brought encouragement to our staff, the children, workers on site, and the wider community. To others who may be considering participating in a Co-Impact trip, I would encourage them to come with openness and a willingness to engage. Ghana is a welcoming, safe, and beautiful country, and visitors will have the opportunity to experience both meaningful work and genuine relationships.

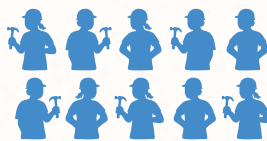

When we combine your unique strengths with the vision of our international partners, we see that true transformation happens not through isolated efforts, but through the enduring power of working together toward a shared goal.

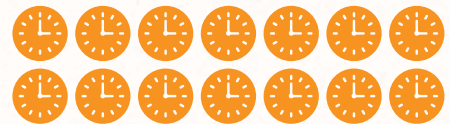
